Dear Members and Friends of First Congregational UCC:

When the Church Council and I met back in June to discuss the possibility of my serving as your part-time interim pastor, we all were hopeful that by February, when Pat and I had made our plans to spend a month well south of here, there would be a new pastor in place. That was an unrealistic expectation on my part, at least. It's not that this is a difficult congregation — it is, I will be happy to tell anyone, a wonderful and faithful congregation. The person who succeeds me will be a fortunate person, indeed. But you have to want to live here; you have to want not just to put up with cold and snow; actually you have to kind of enjoy it, even if by March you've gotten tired of it. So there will be some limitation on the number of people who would want a year-round pastorate here in the Northwoods. Nothing we can do about that, because we live here and we want to live here. As someone explained to me when we moved here, "There's no bad weather; just bad clothes."

But the more important limitation is a self-imposed one that your Search Committee has taken very seriously. We want a good person, a faithful leader, to accompany this congregation on the next stage of our journey together. I can attest that this committee has taken the trust you have placed in them seriously. And I have every reason to believe that the care they have taken will bear fruit, that our remaining wait will not be unbearably long.

But, way back when, when I assumed my interim responsibilities, Pat and I had already planned to be away in February, and we had arranged to have significant work done on our house while we were gone, which would make our house during that time not exactly unlivable, but not very comfortable. So, off we will go. Barb Helmick, your president, has been working diligently to assure worship leadership for the congregation during that time. We are all pleased that for the bulk of the time that Pat and I will be gone, your former pastor Jeff Wartgow will assume pastoral duties. He stepped up to offer, and I am very grateful to him.

I will be back for our Ash Wednesday service on March 6, and for as many Sundays as needed after that leading up to, and probably including Easter. We are already planning Wednesday evening services during Lent preceded by soup suppers. By then the worst of the cold will, we assume, be past us, and I hope that you will avail yourself of this opportunity to reflect on our Lenten themes and follow our Lenten disciples, and, of course, to share that delicious soup and our warm fellowship.

And in the meantime, I have an assignment for you. I want you to think about people who have come to church in the past but whom we haven't seen recently. Perhaps there has been illness; perhaps, sadly, something about their experience of church has turned them off. Perhaps, as one person put it to me, they just got out of practice. I would be happy to talk to these folks, but the most important people to talk to them are members of the congregation. People don't join a pastor — and the one they have now won't be their pastor much longer in any case. People join a community of faith. And it's that community that needs to reach out to them. Now, as we are getting closer to calling a new pastor, would be a good time to gather the flock, to reach out to those who haven't been coming to church. This church is a blessing. People need to be here to experience that blessing.

I will miss you. Really. But in the meantime, come to church and encourage others to come to church. And I'll see you in March when we begin our Lenten journey together.

During this time, we will observe our normal worship schedule, 7:30 a.m. and 10 a.m. on Feb. 10th and 17th and March 3rd; and 9 a.m. (Unity Sunday, with brunch) on February 24th.

Pastor Dale will be back in the pulpit on Ash Wednesday, March 6th. We'll have a soup supper at 5 p.m. followed by the service at 6 p.m.

Search Committee News - February 2019

The Search Committee continues to gather, have discussions, and share in the process of discernment, either physically at our 6:00 a.m. meetings at the church or via long threads of email exchanges. Pastor Dale attended one of our December meetings to offer his professional insights and answer questions. We have interviewed, via phone, two candidates and are following up with one for an in-person interview at Moon Beach Camp in early February.

There has been such an interesting transition in the number of candidate profiles received during our *current* search period, compared to those of the *previous* Search. The Pastoral Search Committee of 2011/2012 which yielded Pastor Mary Anne, sorted through 80 candidate profiles! Since our current Search Committee published the *First Congregational United Church of Christ Profile* online, in mid September, we have received, to date, a total of 16 interested candidates. We experienced a 10 week dry spell from November 5th - January 14th where we received no profiles at all. It's somewhat remarkable what a difference of seven or eight years can make.

### Health News — February 2019

### Flu symptoms: should I see a doctor?

Most people who have the flu (influenza) have a mild illness and don't need to see a doctor. Common flu signs and symptoms include:

Fever above 100F (tho' not everyone with the flu has a fever A cough or sore throat A runny or stuffy nose Muscle aches

Chills

Headache Fatigue

Nausea, vomiting or diarrhea (most common in children)

With some rest and self-care measures at home, the average healthy person can expect to get better within about two weeks.

### Who needs to see a doctor?

If you or someone you're caring for is at high risk of flu-related complications and you suspect the flu, call the doctor. For those at high risk of complications, there's a greater chance that the flu might lead to pneumonia, bronchitis, sinus infections and rarely, hospitalization or death. It can also worsen chronic health problems such as asthma and congestive heart failure. You have an increased risk of flu-related complications if you:

Are younger than 5 years of age, but especially if younger than 2 Are 65 years old or older Are pregnant or have given birth in the past two weeks Are younger than 19 years of age and are receiving long-term aspirin therapy Have certain chronic medical conditions, including asthma, emphysema, heart disease, diabetes, neuromuscular disease, and kidney, liver or blood disease Have a weakened immune system due to medications or HIV Have a body mass index (BMI) or 40 or greater Are an American Indian or Alaska Native Live in a long-term facility. If you're in one of these groups, your doctor may prescribe an antiviral medication to reduce the

severity and length of your symptoms.

### Cold and flu viruses: how long can they live outside the body?

Cold and flu virus-laden droplets may remain infectious for several hours, depending on where they fall. Viruses generally remain active longer on stainless steel, plastic and similar hard surfaces than on fabric and other soft surfaces. Other factors, such as the amount of virus deposited on a surface and the temperature

and humidity of the environment, also determine how long cold and flu viruses stay active outside the body.

It's possible to catch the flu or a cold after handling an object an infected person sneezed or coughed on a few moments ago. But personal contact with an infected person — such as a handshake or breathing in droplets from a cough or sneezes — is the most common way these viruses spread.

The best way to avoid becoming infected with a cold or flu virus is to wash your hand frequently with soap and water or with an alcohol-based sanitizer. Also avoid touching your nose, mouth and eyes or biting your nails. Most importantly —- get a flu vaccine every year. -Mayo Clinic Health Care

We alternate our donations between the Tri-County Council on Domestic Violence and Hope Phones (a division of Medic Mobile). Upon receipt of the used phones, both organizations clear your phone of personal data (if you haven't already done so) and then either refurbish it, or recycle it responsibly for cash.

Think about this: *over 500,000 phones are discarded daily*. If just **1%** of those phones were recycled, the lives of 50 million people would improve! So please, when you get a new phone, don't forget to drop your old one here! The collection box is located in the parlor and remember, we do NOT need chargers, cords and/or the original boxes.

**AND** .... Don't forget our poor little hearing aid and battery collection box that sits next to the Hope Phone collection box. "Business" isn't as brisk with this box as with the phone box, but understandably, hearing aids are an expensive and not-so-frequently-discarded commodity. However, we do have a bag full of batteries to donate, and to date have collected 7 used hearing aids. These are donated to the Starkey Foundation where the devices are refurbished and distributed to children and adults in over 100 countries.
