Pastor's Letter

This month we will be returning to in-person worship. This involves lots of logistical details, like enlisting ushers and training camcorder operators. But beyond that, this is a moment when, as Nathan Kilpatrick of Duke University wrote recently, *"we will all be newcomers."* He goes on,

"Even with a widespread yearning for a return to normalcy, we may find that our familiar places now feel somewhat foreign. Ongoing and necessary health and safety precautions will change the ways we interact in these spaces. On Sunday mornings, social distancing may mean that our usual pew can no longer be 'our pew' because it's now reserved to be the buffered distance between us." We will still be without coffee hour, choir and the circle of people holding hands during the closing song.

Kirkpatrick also point out that, in the year we've been apart, we've all had life experiences that are hard to articulate. We are not the same people we were before the pandemic. We will all be newcomers again, and will need to get gently re-acquainted with each other.

As your interim pastor, I am a newcomer, too. I don't know what in-person worship felt like here before the pandemic, but I know there is no way to re-create it anyway. Instead, we have the opportunity to keep creating new ways of being together.

The good news is that your church has skills for welcoming the newcomer. We know how to actively listen to another's story, how to accommodate differences between people's needs and feelings, how to discern someone's spiritual gifts, and how to focus on the common good of all. This will be a time to activate all those skills.

I believe our worship gatherings will be

- 1) Safe for all: I expect that we will all conduct ourselves so that even those who have not yet been vaccinated will be safe to attend (and as more get vaccinated, it will keep getting safer).
- 2) **Different:** please come with an open heart and mind. Treat in-person worship as a new experience, and find what you love in it, instead of focusing on what you miss.
- 3) **Diverse:** some will continue to worship remotely. Find ways to welcome even those who are not in the room with you.
- 4) **Holy:** remember that worship is not designed to entertain you, but a time to celebrate everything God has done for us, and open yourself to deeper discipleship.

I look forward to seeing some of you in worship, and continuing to minister you, whether remotely, or in person. As always, the Holy Spirit is what binds us together.

President's Message

FINALLY!

In-Person Services will be held on May 9, 16, 23 and 30: 7:30 a.m. and 9:30 a.m.

I'm echoing the sigh of relief I hear throughout the congregation: finally COVID infection numbers are leveling off; finally vaccinations are giving us a greater security as we venture into normal masked living; finally we are able to get back to worship, although limited, in our sanctuary; finally we can even look forward to outside worship with larger attendance; and finally we can get on with being the CHURCH as a loving, giving, partnering, reaching people ready to offer help beyond the restraints placed on us by the past year's events.

Practicing as Christians together, we will temporarily be restricted to not singing or responding aloud as a group in worship. But we'll also soon have the chance to see each other again. Some of us will have the opportunity to meet Pastor Gail for the first time in person. And in May we'll also have the chance to hear a re-born tone chime choir under the direction of our new friend Susan Krivichi, who has put a Chime Choir together for music that fits COVID protocol.

As Luke Aschbrenner learned while attending the Northwest Association UCC annual conference, we are not alone. Churches are struggling to find safe methods of re-opening and of connecting with their members in helpful ways. During the past year First Congregational UCC members and friends have worked together through calling trees, food help for NATH, nominating missions, weekly music and meditation, and constant contact through internet and mail. Much of this activity will continue, and we'd like to urge you to suggest other ways in which we can help members, or charitable drives in the city which reflect the ideas of our mission and vision.

Before turning to a summary of the April Council meeting, I also want to offer enormous thanks to our Search Committee. On the next page you will find the Committee's report that the Profile upon which so much depends as we now begin to look for a settled pastor is submitted to our Association Conference Minister Rob MacDougall. The nine Council-appointed members to the Search Committee have worked faithfully to capture a picture of who we are and what defines the leader we seek as we move forward on our Christian journey. This seems, to me, to be a time when God called the right people together so that in due course this congregation will have a chance to vote on a settled pastor who meets our growing spiritual needs.

Council Report

In April we approved the first steps of Protocol for the In-Person Worship and prepared for a May opening. The Council also noted that, should infection spikes occur, we may need to retreat to meeting solely on-line and that regular communication with the congregation will be necessary. However, masks and distance wherever members meet to participate in a service will still be required. Ushers will help in cleaning between services.

The Vine Family Fund plans continue. A small group of Council met with School Administrators Scott Foster (NPSD) and Delnice Hill (Phelps SD). If approved at our Annual Meeting, we will use 4.5% annually from the Fund for providing teacher grants and a suitable book for all 4th grade students. Two committees of school people and members of our congregation will be formed to help meet these mission dates.

You may have noticed a help wanted ad in the News Review which refers to a technology staff person. Amy Mehlhoff has resigned our IETD part time position. Kathy Holperin is providing what counsel and help she can at this point, although she is currently a Moon Beach full-time employee. A Personnel Committee is seeking to fill the position. If you know someone who might be suitable, contact Paula Hendrickson or Pastor Gail.

The congregation deserves recognition for keeping us financially viable throughout this past year of the pandemic. We are indeed fortunate that budget needs continue to be met. In addition, Council did approve making an application for a second PPP loan from the federal government. That application was approved and PPP funds will help off-set some of the staff need involved with the new IETD (Information and Electronic Technology Director).

Rising vaccination rates and lower infection rates in Vilas County have led the Council to begin Phase One of our process toward opening worship services and the church building.

In-Person Services will be held in the sanctuary during May at 7:30 and 9:30 a.m. with limited seating of 24% capacity (up to 38 people per service). Those who wish to attend may call or email the church office by 3 p.m. on Thursday to let Nan know you plan on attending (715) 479-8501. Masks will be required and ushers will assist with the distanced seating. Communion will be served using single serving packages. Services will run 30-40 minutes.

Upstairs restrooms will be available but other areas of the building will be restricted.

For those who wish to continue worshiping remotely, the service will be recorded live and posted to YouTube by Sunday afternoon. In addition, we will continue sending paper copies of the service to those who have been receiving them.

On May 30th, the 9:30 a.m. service will be held outdoors, weather permitting. Please read the letter sent to you from Council in late April for more details.

Our next meeting will be in person at 6:30 on Monday, May 3rd. We will be meeting in the sanctuary as Monday evenings are already taken in Fellowship Hall. What better place to meet, right?


