The color for the Season after Pentecost is Green, symbolizing the growth and development of the Church. Various symbols of the Trinity, such as the Trefoil and Triangle designs are frequently used to remind us of the coming of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost and the Triune nature of God as Father, Son, and Holy Spirit; Parent, Child, Advocate, Comforter, and Holy Companion; our Creator, Redeemer, and Sustainer.

Ordinary Time refers to that part of the Church Year that does not fall within one of the major seasons and does not observe any specific aspect of the Mystery of Christ. It consists of thirty-four Sundays in the liturgical year and emphasizes personal faith development and nurture, and the growth and enhancement of the Church and the churches. Ordinary Time begins with Baptism of the Lord and encompasses the Sundays after Epiphany including Transfiguration and the Sundays after Pentecost including Reign of Christ. An interesting bit of liturgical trivia is that Baptism of the Lord is counted but is not named as the first Sunday in Ordinary Time.

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A note about the Choral Anthem, Come, Ye Sinners, Poor and Needy, from The Southern Harmony.

A note about the solo, *Plowshare Prayer*: This heartfelt piece shines a new light on what sacred music can look like in the twenty-first century. With lyrics that can be called a modern Psalm, this piece of music truly has something for every listener to latch on to. May it provide comfort to the struggling, oppressed, and unseen. A note from composer Spencer LaJoye: "In the middle of the COVID-19 pandemic, I found myself working for three churches at once. And as much as I loved these communities, this work is draining, both physically and mentally. Soon, health challenges and moral struggles made me unable to serve those faith communities with the grace and integrity I always had. So, I listened to my body, and I left. This song was one of the last things I wrote during this time period. It's honest about my moral struggles and my pain, but it's also a love letter, and probably the most faithful thing I've ever written. It asks the question: what would a prayer sound like if it was used as a plowshare rather than a sword? A tool for growing new things in the most disregarded and traumatized places, rather than a weapon wielded by the institutionally powerful?"
