The Prologue

Today's Witness from the Gospels in Matthew is a pivotal text driving the Gospel narratives. As with many texts guiding and informing the biblical narrative, there is far more in this reported sparring between Peter and Jesus than meets the eye. The hard truth of this text is that, according to most scholars, this conversation between the Christ and the Rock most likely never took place, but in all probability is an exchange added to the Jesus story after the "followers of the way," as Christians were first called, were unceremoniously kicked out of the synagogues, and fed to the ravenous wolves of Rome around 70CE. Jesus was Jewish and never converted to Christianity and would have had no clue what a Christian might be! It is a shocking idea, the concept of which might have even horrified him. Jesus might have considered it an egregious heresy of the highest order! Jesus was Jewish and remained a Jew all his life. His goal was to reform Judaism, the faith-tradition of his birth. In light of this revelatory reality, what relevant word might this text offer the Church in our contemporary settings today? For over two thousand years, the Church has been working to make the most, the best, out of what once was a bad situation!

ROMANS 12:1-8

I appeal to you therefore, brothers and sisters, on the basis of God's mercy, to present your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God, which is your reasonable act of worship. Do not be conformed to this age, but be transformed by the renewing of the mind, so that you may discern what is the will of God, what is good and acceptable and perfect. For by the grace given to me I say to everyone among you not to think of yourself more highly than you ought to think but to think with sober judgment, each according to the measure of faith that God has assigned. For as in one body, we have many members and not all the members have the same function, so we, who are many, are one body in

Christ, and individually we are members one of another. We have gifts that differ according to the grace given to us: prophecy, in proportion to faith; ministry, in ministering; the teacher, in teaching; the encourager, in encouragement; the giver, in sincerity; the leader, in diligence; the compassionate, in cheerfulness!

Listen to what the Spirit of the still speaking God is saving! Thanks be to God!

The color for the Season after Pentecost is Green, symbolizing the growth and development of the Church. Various symbols of the Trinity, such as the Trefoil and Triangle designs are frequently used to remind us of the coming of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost and the Triune nature of God as Father, Son, and Holy Spirit; Parent, Child, Advocate, Comforter, and Holy Companion; our Creator, Redeemer, and Sustainer.

Ordinary Time refers to that part of the Church Year that does not fall within one of the major seasons and does not observe any specific aspect of the Mystery of Christ. It consists of thirty-four Sundays in the liturgical year and emphasizes personal faith development and nurture, and the growth and enhancement of the Church and the churches. Ordinary Time begins with Baptism of the Lord and encompasses the Sundays after Epiphany including Transfiguration and the Sundays after Pentecost including Reign of Christ. An interesting bit of liturgical trivia is that Baptism of the Lord is counted but is not named as the first Sunday in Ordinary Time.
