The Witness from the Hebrew Bible

Lori Hunter JOSHUA 24:1-3a, 14-25

Then Joshua gathered all the tribes of Israel to Shechem and summoned the elders, the heads, the judges, and the officers of Israel, and they presented themselves before God. And Joshua said to all the people, "Thus says the LORD, the God of Israel: Long ago your ancestors — Terah and his sons Abraham and Nahor — lived beyond the Euphrates and served other gods. Then I took your father Abraham from beyond the river and led him through all the land of Canaan and made his offspring many. I gave him Isaac. Now, therefore, revere the LORD and serve God in sincerity and in faithfulness. Put away the gods that your ancestors served beyond the river and in Egypt and serve the LORD. Now if you are unwilling to serve the LORD, choose this day whom you will serve, whether the gods your ancestors served in the region beyond the river or the gods of the Amorites in whose land you are living, but as

for me and my household, we will serve the LORD!" Then the people answered, "Far be it from us that we should forsake the LORD to serve other gods, for it is the LORD our God who brought us and our ancestors up from the land of Egypt, out of the house of slavery, and who did those great signs in our sight. God protected us along all the way that we went and among all the peoples through whom we passed, and the LORD drove out before us all the peoples, the Amorites who lived in the land. Therefore, we also will serve the LORD, for the Holy One is our God." But Joshua said to the people, "You cannot serve the LORD, for God is a holy God! God is a jealous God! God will not forgive your transgressions or your sins! If you forsake the LORD and serve foreign gods, then God will turn and do you harm and consume you, after having done you good." And the people said to Joshua, "No, we will serve the LORD, to serve God!" And they said, "We are witnesses!" He said, "Then put away the foreign gods that are among you, and incline your hearts to the LORD, the God of Israel!" The people said to Joshua, "The LORD our God we will serve, and God we will obey!" So, Joshua made a covenant with the people that day and made statutes and ordinances for them at Shechem.

OLD HUNDREDTH

The flowers adorning the Chancel for worship today are given by Mark and Tobi Johannsen in gratitude for our church family who give of their time, talent, and money to keep this Spirit-led church humming!

The color for the Season after Pentecost is Green, symbolizing the growth and development of the Church. Various symbols of the Trinity, such as the Trefoil and Triangle designs used in our sanctuary, remind us of the coming of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost and the Triune nature of God as Father, Son, and Holy Spirit; Parent, Child, Advocate and Comforter; Creator, Redeemer, and Sustainer.

Ordinary Time refers to that part of the Church Year that does not fall within one of the major seasons and does not observe any specific aspect of the Mystery of Christ. It consists of thirty-four Sundays in the liturgical year and emphasizes personal faith development and nurture, and the growth and enhancement of the Church and the churches. Ordinary Time begins with Baptism of the Lord and encompasses the Sundays after Epiphany including Transfiguration and the Sundays after Pentecost including Reign of Christ. An interesting bit of liturgical trivia is that Baptism of the Lord is counted but is not named as the first Sunday in Ordinary Time.

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
