## The Prologue

Today we read another of the few parables included by the writer of the Gospel of Matthew. This story offers the reminder that we are called to risk everything entrusted to us by the One who gives us everything! In this parable, those who gamble their talents, investing them in various and unknown ways, unsure of the payoff or that there would even be one, are rewarded with a healthy return. The lazy sloth who hid the one solitary talent belonging to his master, a possession trustworthily placed in this servant's care, buried it in the ground for safe keeping. The fearfully anxiety ridden slave is not only rebuked, but is stripped of all his possessions, leaving him with nothing, save for the outer darkness where he is unceremoniously tossed, destined to the dustbin of history described as a place of weeping and gnashing of teeth! Our challenge is to find a relevant word for today as we dare to give thanks for the blessings we presume to be ours. As we cast our bread on the proverbial waters, we look for a relevant message that will inform our contemporary, postmodern, context as we listen for the voice of the holy and still speaking Spirit of God.

# The flowers adorning the Chancel for worship today are given in thanksgiving for all the gifts of life we count as blessings.

The color for the Season after Pentecost is Green, symbolizing the growth and development of the Church. Various symbols of the Trinity, such as the Trefoil and Triangle designs used in our sanctuary, remind us of the coming of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost and the Triune nature of God as Father, Son, and Holy Spirit;

Parent, Child, Advocate and Comforter; Creator, Redeemer, and Sustainer.

Ordinary Time refers to that part of the Church Year that does not fall within one of the major seasons and does not observe any specific aspect of the Mystery of Christ. It consists of thirty-four Sundays in the liturgical year and emphasizes personal faith development and nurture, and the growth and enhancement of the Church and the churches. Ordinary Time begins with Baptism of the Lord and encompasses the Sundays after Epiphany including Transfiguration and the Sundays after Pentecost including Reign of Christ. An interesting bit of liturgical trivia is that Baptism of the Lord is counted but is not named as the first Sunday in Ordinary Time.
