#### **CHURCH COUNCIL**

Hello Congregation!

The Church Council welcomed three new members at its October 9<sup>th</sup> meeting. Discussion included review of the Annual Congregational Meeting that was held in the Fellowship Hall on October 1<sup>st</sup>. A quorum was declared and approximately 48 members were in attendance. The vote was unanimous in approval of the new members, Kristen Anchor, Carol Marshall, and Eric Olsen. Eighty-seven percent approved moving forward with the process toward becoming an Open and Affirming (ONA) church. Pastor Tim will lead this process.

Building and Grounds advised they are continuing to assemble and review bids for the heating/cooling systems. They are also looking into maintenance contracts for heating and cooling and for the roof. Discussion also centered on updating our Building Use Policy and that process is well under way.

Upcoming events included a new time, 5:00 p.m. for the Christmas Eve Service. The regular service, the Fourth Sunday of Advent, will be at 9:00 a.m.

It was noted that the Stewardship Campaign begins October 22<sup>nd</sup> and pledges will be blessed on November 12<sup>th</sup>. Currently there are twenty households that pledge. Online giving has been increasing and more are giving non-pledged identifiable gifts. Traditionally, the budget has reflected pledged amounts. That is no longer the case as the budget now reveals that non-pledged identifiable gifts make up the majority of offerings.

With the addition of new Church Council members, the meeting time was reviewed. It will continue to be held on the second Monday of the month but will begin at 5:45 pm.

I was reading a short devotional sometime this past month and it reminded me of how choirs work. The situation the author addressed was about a conflict in a congregation that was contemplating a remodeling project of their sanctuary. Tensions were running a bit high with varied opinions of what and how things should be done! (Imagine that! ) Then an elderly woman of 90 plus years spoke words that brought things back into perspective. She announced, "Both

sides may be right, but we are not called to be right, we are called to be reconciled!" Sometimes instead of always needing to be right, we may want to approach subjects with the idea that we may be wrong. This can allow us to learn from each other or at least try to understand a different view.

You may ask, "What does this have to do with choirs?" Well, when we come together to learn a piece of music we must listen to all parts (sides) and we cannot assume we are right and the other parts are wrong because we would never be in harmony. We are called to be reconciled with each other and the music. I think this approach to learning music, that we are open to the fact that we are wrong, may be a lesson we can take into other areas of life. I know it is something I will be striving to do a bit more of, outside of music!

We will be working on Advent and Christmas planning this next week and hope to bring some meaningful music to celebrate the seasons in December.

## Can you help the residents of Frederick Place?

#### Please help us make this a church-wide mission.

Frederick Place is a 16-bed temporary emergency housing shelter for families run by the Northwoods Alliance for Temporary Housing (NATH). Admission is on a first come, first-serve basis. Applicants must meet the federal and state definitions of homelessness including income limits. Residents receive services to help them draft and execute a plan for obtaining permanent housing. There is a zero-tolerance policy for violence, drug use, or alcohol use in the home. Residents must be able to care for themselves without assistance. While the initial admission is for 30 days, stays may be extended for up to 90 days. There are guidelines for reapplying after 90 days to prevent additional bouts of homelessness.

Some of the ways that First Congregational United Church of Christ can assist the residence are:

- \* Help prepare or shop for ingredients for the monthly meals we are currently providing.
- \* Donate sides, such as bread, butter, dessert, and milk or juice.
- \* Drive the meals to Rhinelander on the meal day.
- \* Donate cash to help offset the cost of the meals.
- \* Donate needed items for the Wish List published monthly on the Frederick Place website; items can be purchased on Amazon and shipped directly to Frederick Place. (These items are given to the residents when they obtain housing to help them set up housekeeping.)

  We are so grateful for your financial support and your "labor of love" in preparing the monthly meals.

We are once again asking for help to prepare our chili dinner.

## MAGGIE BALL MISSION FUND: Ideas Welcome

First Congregational United Church of Christ is blessed with an investment fund created specifically for "missions." It was established in 2010 when the church received a generous bequest from the estate of Maggie Ball. Mrs. Ball was an Illinois resident who spent her summers in Eagle River and attended this church.

The investment fund generates approximately \$7,000 annually. That money is available "for special mission involvements (over and above those in the General Budget) of the congregation, both local and global."

The Church Council approves disbursements from the fund, but ideas for how the monies should be spent may be suggested by any member of our congregation. With the approval of the Council, I am working to get the word out and encourage members to suggest mission efforts that could benefit from the support of the Maggie Ball Mission Fund.

So, if you have thoughts or suggestions, please feel free to reach out to me (Barbara Helmick) or go directly to Council. I will compile a list of any ideas I receive and either forward it or present it to Council.

Please note: Money is limited, and I have already received suggestions from several people. If you would like to help with vetting the requests and perhaps prioritizing them, please let me know. I will be passing all suggestions/requests on to Council members. But since the fund provides a finite amount of money each year, it may be helpful to recommend dollar amounts for each and/or suggest priorities. That's a task that one person should NOT do alone.

Here are the ideas that have been suggested so far (in no particular order):

- Northwoods Alliance for Temporary Housing
- Caritas
- Supporting Daniel Brunstad's efforts to add ADA-accessible playground equipment behind City Hall
- Maui relief
- Supporting a First UCC youth mission effort/trip
- Ensuring local school students continue to receive lunch at school, by paying their cafeteria debts when their families are unable to do so.
- Supporting the Micah Project in Tegucigalpa, Honduras

**Please note:** Church Council has committed \$1,700 annually from the Maggie Ball Mission Fund annual disbursement for each of the next five years to support the Wisconsin Conference United Church of Christ's Leadership Forward program. More details will be forthcoming about this mission initiative.

If uncertain the plastic is acceptable just apply pressure using a finger and if it stretches it is good, if it does not stretch and breaks it is not good. Also, if you see a #4 recycling symbol it is good. These plastics are used to make composite materials used in making ecofriendly products, one being benches which over time we can earn to be placed on church property.

Plans to do our first weighing of Septembers collection will be Sunday October 8<sup>th</sup>. after church for whoever would like to join to see how the bags are weighed and see what our total is for the first month. Kamie will then report the amount at Church the 15<sup>th</sup>, as well as in the November mouse.

People came forward and did for me and wouldn't take no for an answer. Suddenly being an island and without biological family wasn't an issue at all. I can't tell you how many times I've had tears in my eyes over the generosity, love, care and support I've been given.

Food is arriving on a regular basis, household chores are being completed, dogs are being given lots of walks and exercise, and any transportation I need to doctor appointments or anywhere has been provided. You are all amazing and I am blessed beyond belief.

This will, no doubt, be a long and slow recovery for me. I likely face more surgery, but in spite of it all, I remind myself that it could have been a lot worse. Eventually I will heal. My attitude is upbeat and optimistic, and I will survive.

Each and every one of you holds a special place in my heart and my gratitude knows no bounds. Truly, you ARE my family, and I don't know what I would do without you. Thank you for being there for me. Everyone keeps telling me what they do is just a little thing but honestly, you have no idea. Just unscrewing the lid off a jar is major. Or slicing some cheese. Or bringing in my mail. It's all the little things you do that make my life so much easier. And then there's the big things . . . like transporting me all the way to Wausau for follow-up doctor appointments, heavy duty yard work or dropping whatever you are doing at a moment's notice to come and fix something in my home. There is no way I will ever, ever, ever be able to repay all the kindness and love that's been given me and for one of the few times in my life, I am speechless.

Right now, I've come to look at my day-to-day existence as a patchwork quilt. Slowly but surely squares are getting completed, added to the quilt, and I am becoming whole. I have all of you to thank for that. I love you beyond words.

Here is the book review from Goodreads.

Michael Crichton meets The Time Traveler's Wife in this powerful debut novel in which a man, frozen in the Arctic ice for more than a century, awakens in the present day.

Dr. Kate Philo and her scientific exploration team make a breathtaking discovery in the Arctic: the body of a man buried deep in the ice. As a scientist in a groundbreaking project run by the egocentric and paranoid Erastus Carthage, Kate has brought small creatures-plankton, krill, shrimp-"back to life." Never have the team's methods been attempted on a large life form.

Heedless of the consequences, Carthage orders that the frozen man be brought back to the lab in Boston, and reanimated. As the man begins to regain his memories, the team learns that he was-is-a judge, Jeremiah Rice, and the last thing he remembers is falling overboard into the Arctic Ocean in 1906. When news of the Lazarus Project and Jeremiah Rice breaks, it ignites a media firestorm and massive protests by religious fundamentalists.

Thrown together by circumstances beyond their control, Kate and Jeremiah grow closer. But the clock is ticking and Jeremiah's new life is slipping away. With Carthage planning to exploit Jeremiah while he can, Kate must decide how far she is willing to go to protect the man she has come to love.

A gripping, poignant, and thoroughly original thriller, Stephen Kiernan's provocative debut novel raises disturbing questions about the very nature of life and humanity-man as a scientific subject, as a tabloid plaything, as a living being: A curiosity.

#### Stewardship Moment, October 15, 2023

Perhaps when you saw in our worship folder that we were going to have a stewardship moment this morning, you groaned inwardly, or even outwardly. Nobody likes to ask people for money; and a lot of people don't like to be asked for money.

I'm not going to ask you to give money. I know that you probably won't believe this, but I mean it. Pledging isn't about money. The pledge sermon, if there is one, isn't the sermon on the amount. It's about faith. Jesus talked a lot about money; a lot more than he talked about sex, by the way, which was not at all. He talked about money as something that we can sometimes worship as a replacement for God. But when it came to giving money, he praised the poor widow who clinked her paltry copper coins into the offering jar in the temple. She gave all she had. By contrast he didn't praise the wealthy people who made quite the show of plunking their silver coins into the jar. There was, after all, a lot more where that came from. No, Jesus would never deliver a sermon on the amount.

Jesus cared about how much people cared. Faith shouldn't be what is left over after we've devoted your energy and our resources to what is really important to us. Faith should be what's really important to you. This church has been a home to me; a refuge. It's important to me. I've gotten to know wonderful people in this church, people who have enriched my life in ways that money never could. What this church has provided to me is what I want to help it provide to others.

So, as my pastor in the Riverside Church in New York City used tell us on Pledge Sunday, "Don't give until it hurts. Give until it feels good." Give until it feels good. Whether it clinks or plunks, give until it feels good. That's why we call it an "offering" not a "contribution" and certainly not "dues." As the poet James Russell Lowell put it, "not what we give, but what we share; for the gift without the giver is bare."

Stewardship, quite simply, is recognizing that everything we have and everything we are is a gift from God and being grateful and generous with those gifts. God reveals His perfect and infinite love for us most visibly in His Son, Jesus Christ. A steward makes God's love visible by imitating Jesus. A few years ago I took a risk and agreed to serve on a committee in this church. It was something I had NEVER done before in my life AND I was amazed to discover, I really enjoyed the experience. I got to know some people I didn't know, I discovered I had some skills that fit the situation. I wouldn't have taken what felt like a huge step if someone hadn't nudged me and if someone else hadn't asked me. (in fact, the previous year I had turned down a request to serve on a board because I was totally intimidated.) The other thing I discovered is that people in this church are very helpful and encouraging. There were other things our committee needed to do....one was coordinating one of our monthly church dinners. I didn't have a clue how to organize our small group but others willingly shepherded me through the process.

That experience got me thinking about church and community and stewardship. It seems to me that we are stewards of all that we are and all that we have been given in our lives. As a steward we find ways to help/encourage/support/care/guide.

For me, a barebones expression of my faith has two aspects. I experience both a deep yearning and deep gratitude. I yearn to experience and understand God in my life and at the same time I feel so grateful for my life and all the people and experiences that I are part of my days. I want to explore ways to share this grace with others. That's me at my best. Then there are are other days or weeks when I lose sight of my path, feel ungrateful and grumpy or sad, sometimes angry. Don't we all?

So I am a steward of my life as well as this earth and all that goes into our coexistence here. It is through my relationships with people and all that surrounds me that I experience God and am renewed again and again.

I'm an ecumenical gal. My parents had what was called a mixed marriage: Dad was Catholic and Mom was a member of the United Church of Canada (our

UCC). My early experience of church was as a place for individual communion with God, a place for worship and prayer but not really communal or social. I have been part of a variety of church and faith communities since then. Here, in this place, we have a need and a place for each of us, in whatever ways we find suit us, to help this community of fellow sojourners grow and deepen in our faith.

I really like the church service and the feeling of community that develops by sharing this regular ritual together. Some of us need this Sunday space in our lives for quiet and reverence and silent support. Some of us do well to simply get here some of the time. Some weeks I can't even do that. Then there are others of us who are great at being present almost every Sunday. Some folks are good at organizing, or welcoming or baking or singing and playing instruments, maintaining physical structure or reaching out to others, making others laugh or a host of other things that make us the varied and interesting group of seekers that we are. This church community is amazing in its support of new or varied activities to encourage our faith journey....whether that is Flock, reading group, adult study groups, women's fellowship, helping fix and maintain things, monitoring finances, providing financial support or reaching outward into the community through meals for NATH, monthly mission activities, the new community garden project beginning in 2024.. Through shared activities here and in the broader community we get to know each other, to learn and laugh and feel part of this group of seekers not to mention deepening our faith.

We grow in this community through our financial support for the ongoing work of the church, the building and the people. In these current times as we face structural challenges this is a crucial component of our participation in community building.

Thank you to so many of you for helping me to find my next steps when I feel lost or giving me the hug I needed without asking questions; for letting me get to know you and learn from each of you. Thank you also for the times of silence and quiet. I NEED YOU, EVERYONE ONE OF YOU. This is the amazing thing I learned and am learning here. Whether I know you already or not I need your shared participation in my life.


