JANUARY COLLECTION: Acts of KINDNESS

We are kicking off 2024 by collecting KINDNESS during the month of January.

Say, what? Yes, KINDNESS.

We all need KINDNESS in our lives. The whole world needs KINDNESS. So, let's give it to each other and to anyone else we can. In other words, as Pastor Tim would say, "Keep doing what you do so well." And let's be more aware of KINDNESS when we receive it and when we see it. But, for this to be a "collection," we need you to tell us about it!

Snowbirds, listen up: You can participate, too!

Here's how it works:

- 1. First, like all our collections, contributors will remain anonymous. This is not an effort to pat anyone on the back for the things they do. It's designed to help ALL of us keep KINDNESS top of mind whether as a recipient, a benefactor, or observer as we go through our daily lives.
- 2. If you see an act of KINDNESS, please write it down no matter how big or small, routine, or unique, please take a minute to write it down on a post-it and "post it" on the bulletin board in the Narthex. (Post-It provided at the board.) Here are some examples. (but please don't be limited by them).

a. A woman held the door open for me at Kwik Trip.
b. My neighbor was ill, so I did his grocery shopping for him.
c. I cleared snow from my neighbor's drive.
d. A clerk at the store was especially friendly and turned my day around.
e. I saw someone stop to help someone change a flat tire.

- 3. Again, this is not about patting ourselves on the back. It's about making us more aware of the acts of KINDNESS taking place all around us, as well as making us more aware of how we are impacted by kind gestures, and how we can change the lives of others perhaps only briefly by being kind.
- 4. If you're a snowbird or otherwise gone during the month of January, you can participate, too. Just drop your KINDNESS contribution in the mail and send it to First UCC Kindness Collection, PO Box 1385, Eagle River, WI 54521, or email it to office@eagleriverucc.org. Please put KINDNESS in the subject line.

So, let's plaster the display area in the Narthex with acts of KINDNESS that we see, do and receive. "In a world where you can be anything, be kind."

REMINDER OF RECYCLING MISSION

As we begin a new year let's keep the momentum going of bringing in your soft plastics. We had a great start in 2023 so let's continue to strive to increase our soft plastics collection in 2024. Remember this is an ONGOING mission. You can encourage other family members, friends, neighbors.... to give you their **Soft** plastics to bring in and help our cause. We want to make sure to keep as much of these plastics out of the landfill as possible!!

Remember that the plastics need to be **SOFT and able to stretch when you push a finger against it. You can also check the back to see if it has the recycling symbol #4 or #2. **NO PET FOOD/ BIRD **FEED BAGS, CELLOPHANE WRAP** (ex. used to wrap flower bouquets) **OR HARD PLASTIC CONTAINERS** as all of these do not stretch when a finger is pressed against it.

Hello Friends above is the schedule for providing treats for Coffee Hour after church. We're happy that so many of you have volunteered to provide this nice addition to the coffee hour social time that enhances our worship together. Here are a few notes regarding your duties etc.:

- 1. You are only responsible for providing a treat on the assigned Sunday. If you want to set up the coffee maker prior to the service either Joy or Susan can show you how that is done. We have assigned two people each Sunday to make it less of a burden. There have been as many as 60 people at the 9:00 a.m. service.
- 2. You may bring pastries, cookies, bars, fruit, cheese and crackers or any other items you think would be nice for the social time. Please make sure that your item is ready to serve (i.e., bars cut up, placed on a plate if needed, provide a serving utensil etc.) There are some gluten free treats in the cabinet above the sink. There are plates and napkins and coffee cups in the Parlor to be used for coffee hour.
- 3. If you cannot provide treats on your assigned Sunday, please **first** contact another person on the list to see if you can switch your Sunday assignments. The contact information for all of those who volunteered is listed at the top of the schedule. If that fails, please contact Susan or Joy to let them know that you will not be available on a given Sunday.
- 4. You are not required to clean up afterwards, so please do not worry if you can only drop off your treats and leave. We will make sure everything is cleaned up afterwards. If you can help clean up, that is great, and there is a very nice vacuum stored in the church office on the wall charger that can be used to vacuum the carpet after. Coffee grounds can be placed in the garbage can in the parlor and the pot should be emptied and rinsed.
