FROM THE PASTOR

I would like to begin my *Church Mouse* article by saying thank you for the reception this past Sunday. Your celebrating with me meant the world to me. While I regret to some degree not being able to attend graduation exercises in Pretoria, South Africa, you helped me immensely deal with those negative emotions. I made the right decision! I have never been roasted in such a lovely way before! The comments were hysterical! I was truly humbled by the whole party and am especially grateful for the extravagant gift. Thank you!!! I am so happy to be done with this PhD research and writing, the finished product the end of a long and winding road indeed. Since my arrival as your pastor, you all have been so supportive of my work as I have negotiated all the hoops demanded with this kind of study. Some days it seemed as if I was taking two steps backward for every slow step forward. Many times, I considered giving up and abandoning the work, but your encouragement helped me stay the course. I will be forever grateful for that! My hope is that this research in biblical hospitality might help at least one local missional church leap the hurdle toward becoming a hospitably welcoming and inclusive congregation.

Your participation guarantees that this process is indeed a process, fully vetted, with the goal of addressing your concerns, answering questions as they arise. On behalf of the Task Force, I thank you for the due diligence and the input you are giving to this most important congregational journey and anticipated decision.

As we await the full bloom of spring and a summer of leisure activities, I want to give you my schedule for late May and early June. I will be leaving for vacation after our Pentecost service on Sunday, May 19th, traveling south as usual. I will be attending my spring clergy retreat, to be held this year in Bryson City, North Carolina at a mountain cabin from June 2-7. I will be returning to Eagle River on Wednesday, June 12th, ready and refreshed to do my pastoral duties and to enjoy the beautiful weather and these lovely Northwoods.

Please make a note that our annual celebration of our scholarship recipients will be a part of our Pentecost celebration in worship on Sunday, May 19th. One quick reminder, our next quarterly Fellowship Gathering in Fellowship Hall will be on Sunday, July 7th. The Service Support Team (SST), under the leadership of Joy Turpin, has agreed to coordinate these quarterly events. Our outdoor services are scheduled for June 30th, July 28th, and August 25th, the last Sundays of those months. We are planning for a day outing, a picnic, at Moon Beach, but dates and times have not yet been finalized. Stay tuned!

FROM THE COUNCIL PRESIDENT

Hello Congregation,

As I look out the window and watch the world become greener, spring has really sprung. April's buds are promising May blooms. And in a few sheltered spots, they are already appearing.

It reminds me of our church, a safe place where all are welcome to receive the word of the Lord and nurture our own spiritual journey in peace and with the joy of fellowship. First Congregational is a place where we practice what Jesus taught, that all are welcome here.

I hope you will take the time and attend one or more of the group discussions devoted to the Open and Affirming process the first of which will be this Sunday, May 5th. The O & A Task Force members who spoke in April gave powerful stories of their journey about their reasons for wanting to lead this process. On the topic of inclusion, I will also say I miss our Boards – though not ALL the meetings and reports. It is through this organizational structure where I got to know so many in our church family. The one thing I have discovered without the Boards is the work that each individual contributed and the flavor each person brought is missed.

Once again, we are developing the time and talent survey. It is my hope that if there is an area of interest to which you feel called to serve, perhaps having served in the past and would like to do so again, that you will let us know. I have always found that our congregation has always risen to the challenge when asked. But now there is not so much asking. You may wonder what do I join? What is there to join?

Of course there is Bible study, reading groups, time with children, choir, Church Council, but there are many teams in place to provide your input. There is also the Service Support Team that coordinates ushers and bakers for Sunday services, a ministry group to help identify mission projects and giving, the Finance Team that reviews budget, funds, and monthly accounting, there is also the Gifts and Endowment Committee that monitors investments, Scholarship

Committee, Building and Grounds, Women's Fellowship, Flock, Christian Education, technology, fundraising, fellowship ideas, and hospitality, just to name a few.

But what happens if you are not asked? Will you raise your hand? Do you even know if you have a passion or talent in a certain area? I certainly never thought I would be anywhere in church except seated in the pew. I liked singing and so I joined the choir. Oh, what joy! Then someone asked if I would join the Trustees. Terror! But there I was those many years ago with no idea what any of it meant. But there were others who helped show me the way. I learned, and I grew. The Church Council met on April 8th and included discussion topics regarding finances, a projected budget shortfall, and replacing longtime finance volunteer Paula Hendrickson. From this edition of the Church Mouse forward, Information will be included for your perusal.

It was noted during the meeting that a motor went out on the boiler which provides hot water to some zones in the building, the replacement cost \$1,390. This is a different system than the furnaces that were just replaced which provide hot air and air conditioning to other zones. The air conditioning systems will be evaluated in the near future as we get into warmer weather. Given the size, complexity, and age of the heating and cooling systems there will be various parts that need replacing due to wear and tear throughout the year.

Melody of Compassion continues to receive regular fund requests from persons in need. Approximately \$150-\$200 a month is being given, typically in the form of \$25 gas or grocery cards. Those wishing to donate a card or cash outside of the collection coinage at Sunday Services, can stop by the office during business hours or can mark an envelope designating the gift for Melody of Compassion.

Several documents are in the process of final update, including the building use policy and the Church Constitution. A six-month review of the Strategic Plan was also conducted.

Mark your calendar: The date for Scholarship Sunday is scheduled for May 19th. We were able to secure two dates for the Brat and Bake sale. These dates are Wednesday, July 3rd and Friday, August 30th. There will also be a men's breakfast again this year on Sunday, July 7th, as part of our quarterly Fellowship Gatherings.

The Church Council meets on the 2nd Monday of the month at 6:00 p.m. in the Conference Room. Church members are welcome to attend.

The next meeting is May 13th.

APRIL-MAY COLLECTION: Forest County Humane Society

We got a late start on this monthly collection for April. So, we have opted to extend it through at least mid-May! The **Forest County Humane Society** operates a small but dedicated shelter in Crandon, caring for dogs, cats, puppies, kittens, and, quite likely, a few other types of animals. **It is filled to capacity!** And has a WAITING LIST! It takes a lot of resources, both human and otherwise, to care for so many of God's creatures.

Our church is helping this cause by collecting much needed supplies, including canned and dry dog, puppy, cat and kitten food, dog and cat treats and toys, chews, Kongs, and tennis balls, blankets, towels, sheets, etc. Also included are litter boxes, bed beds, cleaning supplies (paper towels, bleach, garbage bags), gift cards to Amazon, Chewy, Walmart, Home Depot, and local gas cards. A complete list of needed items is available on the table in the Narthex.


