FROM THE PASTOR

I just want to say how delightful it has been to be back with you after a time of retreat and vacation. I missed you all and it was great to get back home to the Northwoods. I am very pleased with the attendance in worship. Sundays are exciting! Word seems to be getting out about what a wonderful congregation this church is. Keep up the good work! As we continue our journey through the Open and Affirming process concerns on occasion are voiced to members of the O & A Task Force. I realize that everyone is not comfortable speaking in public about issues that come to mind. One of the concerns that has been privately raised is that if the church chooses to become an Open and Affirming congregation that certain requirements, I am assuming required by the United Church of Christ, will be imposed on the church, that there will be some "have tos" that go along with embracing this designation. Let me clearly state that this is not the case. As a covenantal partner within the UCC, as opposed to being a connectional church as with other denominational structures, we are an autonomous body, our polity allowing us to make our own decisions, every time, all the time. Since this church has been a hospitably welcoming and inclusive congregation for many years, choosing to become Open and Affirming frankly will not be noticeable in the day-to-day life of the community. Yes, we would acknowledge this designation in our written materials, but our routines would continue to be routine! In no way would we be coerced or manipulated, forced, into any activity that stretch our comfort zones beyond their capacity. I hope this clears up any misunderstanding about this concern.

As we move further into summer many opportunities avail themselves to the church. July begins with the Fellowship Gathering on Sunday, July 7th in Fellowship Hall hosted by the men who will prepare breakfast. This will be our second annual holiday weekend breakfast. On Sunday, July 14th we will welcome new members into the congregation during worship and then will gather at the Marshalls for a cookout and picnic. There is much more happening this summer, and you can read the details elsewhere in the Church Mouse. I hope you are all having a fabulous summer!

FROM THE CHURCH COUNCIL PRESIDENT

Hello Congregation,

The Church Council met June 10th and among items that were approved included mission funds awarded to three organizations. Funds are being distributed to Bosnia Missionaries who will receive \$1,000; Re-Member Pine Ridge Reservation, \$1,000; and Antoinette Brown Society, \$500.

The Annual Congregational Meeting will be held on September 8th. On July 11th we will begin the budget process for 2025 to meet deadlines ahead of the meeting.

Eligible church members who are interested in serving on the Church Council are encouraged to reach out to any current Council member, Pastor Tim, or Debbie Brown in the Church Office. The Council is also seeking a secretary who will begin their duties at the September Church Council meeting, the first meeting following the Annual Congregational Meeting.

A Building Use Policy has been approved and copies are available in the Church Office. In other building news, carpet cleaning was approved for the main floor office suite, including the parlor and chairs, and the elevator.

Estimates to replace the air conditioning were reviewed, however because of the expense and because the units are still functioning, we will continue to monitor as necessary. Debbie Brown, Church Administrator, advised that we are already getting savings from the LED bulbs that had been installed on the main floor and it was agreed to complete the lower level at a cost of \$1,500 for the bulbs. Eric Olson volunteered to install them.

The Sanctuary will soon see a new tri-fold Welcome Brochure along with welcome cards for the pew racks designed to welcome our guests and provide information about the church.
