The Prologue

The early Church faced a huge problem as it got its feet off the ground, looking to find its wings. They were labeled as cannibals, a term that had not yet been coined, as incestuous, and as atheists. We are reminded in their plight, the danger of labels, the damage caused by labeling. Name calling is a form of bullying and is never acceptable because words do hurt, causing immense pain and suffering. And yet, as we all know, are fully aware, labels can be most gratuitous, emboldening and empowering individuals and groups to become all they can be.

The color for the Season after Pentecost is Green, symbolizing the growth and development of the Church. Various symbols of the Trinity, such as the Trefoil and Triangle designs used in our sanctuary, remind us of the coming of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost and the Triune nature of God as Father, Son, and Holy Spirit; Parent, Child, Advocate and Comforter; Creator, Redeemer, and Sustainer.

Ordinary Time refers to that part of the Church Year that does not fall within one of the major seasons and does not observe any specific aspect of the Mystery of Christ. It consists of thirty-four Sundays in the liturgical year counted backwards from the Reign of Christ and emphasizes personal faith development and nurture, and the growth and enhancement of the Church and the churches.
